



18 HPI – 25 x 19.5cm (10 x 7 3/4in)


This design was stitched using DMC stranded cotton on 28-count evenweave over two threads of the fabric.



MARIA DIAZ'S DESIGNER'S SECRETS

BACKSTITCH BEAUTY

I was looking forward to defining the beautiful stonework of the Houses of Parliament in backstitch, and am really pleased by the effect this has created. It's always the little details that make a project fun and a real joy to research and design. I discovered in my research that a light is always illuminated above Big Ben's clock face when Parliament is in session, so I made sure I included this in the design. The clock face shows that the time is 5pm. Isn't it good to see that Parliament is still hard at work at this hour!



A TIMELESS TALE



I experimented with the idea of including the London Eye in this design, as it is visible from the South Bank and I thought it might make a fun addition to the project. However, it didn't quite seem in keeping with the rest of the design – the golden beauty of Parliament is so timeless that it seemed to jar a little. In the end, I decided not to include it, so the study

could be from any time in the last century. I did, however, include two swans swimming on the Thames to draw the eye towards the golden reflection of the building in the water.
